Introduction

The Vietnam Security Police Association, Inc. All "Feelings and Thoughts" submitted must be emailed to Don Poss. Please do not fax or snail-mail your story or photos, as I simply cannot take the time to retype or scan for you. By emailing comments, I can copy and drop it into my word processor for posting.

- Please write using UPPER *and* lower case letters, appropriately. Email submitted in <u>all upper</u> <u>case letters</u> cannot be retyped nor published.
- If you are a Veteran, always include your Name, Unit(s) and Base(s), and the year(s) in-country.
- If you served as a dog handler in the military, or police, state where and when, and your dog's name and number (if known).
- I shouldn't have to say this, but we are a family webpage: No profanity. No exceptions. No racial or derogitory remarks or comments. No exceptions.

PHOTOS

- **Be selective! Chose your best photos.** We want to post them all, however, 500 photos of groups standing in front of the monument would grow tedious to view. But, if you can name your group in the caption, then we will post them.
- Check out the photos as they are posted. If you have a "different" or touching photo, send it in. If you have a better photo similar to one posted--send it in. If it is your favorite photo--send it in.
- Although not every photo can be posted, if there is enough interest we are thinking about posting every photo and story sent in on a CD for archiving at the March Field Museum. The CD may be available (too early to tell at this point) to the public, as a fund-raiser for the March Field Museum, War Dogs project, and/or other events by the VSPA, VDHA, and VFW.
- Attach any photos you want to an email (JPG format!). In your email, write a brief caption about each photo in the email, and link each caption to the name of the photo attached.
- Before submitting the email, please use spell-check.
- **Photos Do Not:** Write on the front of the photo, Colorize, Crop, Resize, Optimize, fold, bend, staple, or give to your dog to play with!







Rainy tribute to war dogs

► An estimated 2,000 people from across the nation gather for the dedication at March Field Air Museum.

They were Bingo, Rex, Ken, Max, Duke and a thousand other names — best buddles of soldiers who read them letters and shared cookies and cakes from home while serving on the front lines in South Vietnam.

These memories of specially trained war dogs evoked tearful responses Monday from more than 100 Vietnam War combat veterans who lined up and lovingly patted the bronze replica of a German shepherd depicted in the War Dog Memorial at March Fleid Air Museum.

Some in the crowd, estimated al 2,000 people, traveled from all over the country and stood in the rain Monday morning to attend the dedication ceremony for the 18foot tall bronze statue. The statue depicts a German shepherd sitting on alert, held on leash by a soldier who appears to be moving through a wall — symbolizing moving from a safe zone into hurm's way.

"Everybody has a reason for being here." Air Force veteran Tom Mitchell of San Diego told the crowd. "These dogs were everything to us."

Mitchell is one of the founders of the Vietnam Dog Handlers Association that held a reunion over the weekend in Riverside.

When the dog hundlers returned home to

resume civilian lives, the 4,000 mostly German shepherds used in South Vietnam were euthanized because the Pentagon feared they could harm people if adopted into the handlers' families.

Mitchell said 279 dogs were killed in combat during the Vietnam War while helping to protect U.S. troops from any bushes, hidden mines and trip-wires. The dogs could snift scents of the energy and explosives. Dogs could hear the near lnaudible sound of a thin wire vibrating in the wind that was connected to hidden explosives.

The dogs would freeze to alert their bandlers by pointing to hidden dangers. The association estimates 10,000 soldiers' lives were saved by the dogs' acute senses.

Mitchell sold Monday's min reminded him of the times in Vietnam when his dog joined him under his rain poncho. He laughed at the memory of the "nice dog smell" of the soggy canine cuddled next to him.

Many dog breeders, along with about 50 canine teams from police departments from throughout the state, brought dogs to Monday's event. The miseum's parking lot and a side street were filled with cars.

The statue brought tears to the eyes of many veterans who paused for a momeni, touched the statue and then placed small bouquets at the dog's paws. Air Force veteran Steve Glab of Chicago, dressed in military fatigues, also placed a small packet of ashes at the base of the memorial. He said they were from three dogs he previously owned.

Jack Moore of Alexandria, Va., spotted the War Dog Memorial on the internet and just had to come cross-country to see the statue and dedication.

The 80-year-old Marine Corp veteran said his dog, Rex, belped him ferret out traps and enemy soldiers in the jungles of Guam during World War II. Rex served him loyally for a year in combat, keeping him safe from enemy fire, be said.

"I brought old Rex home with me and had him until 1955 when I had to put him down," Moore said.

Sculptor Tom Schomberg of Denver, commissioned to create the blackened bronze memorial, was moved by the out-pouring of emotion when his work was unveiled.

He posed for pictures with combat veterans in front of the statue at the end of the ceremony that included a fly-over of vintage warbirds by the March Aero Club and music about the dogs composed and performed by David Glen Elsiey and his band.

State Supreme Court Associate Justice Ming W. Chin told the crowd he remembered his combat tour in South Vietnam as an Army officer.

"There was never any question whether a soldier could count on his war dog," he said. "Let us never make a mistake and leave behind our canine friends again."

Some believe the practice of killing the dogs after the war was wrong.

Sleve Janke, an Air Force veteran, said he is trying to ensure that doesn't suppen by educating today's young people about war dogs. He has used his Vietnam War experiences as a dog handler in history courses he teaches at a private Christian school in Carlstend, N.J.

"Most people never knew we used dogs in Vietnam," said Janke, a member of the dog handlers group.

When he went to Vietnam in 1970 as a 20-year-old, Janke learned that he could only trust his dog Kobuc. Kobuc's instincts were keen, leashing in Janke's youthful bravado at crucial times.

"He was my friend, a friend that lived on the end of a leash," Janke said. He said he is often overcome by emotion in telling his students about Kobuc, whom he described as a "gift from God."

"This," he said of the memorial, "is very special. This is a place for healing."

The memorial was part of a \$1 million fund-raising campaign by Corona Mayor Jeffrey Bennett, president and founder of Nature's Recipe Pet Foods.





The simple fact is: American War Dogs were left behind in Vietnam -- abandoned -- intentionally.

About the War Dogs Memorial location - The first of two War Dogs Memorials will be unveiled on Presidents Day, 2000, at March Air Field (Air Reserve Base; adjoining the former AFB).

As a former USAF K-9 handler (Đà Nàng, Blackie,1965-1966), I believe March Field Museum is the perfect location for the towering War Dog and Handler monument. A prime location, both poetic and highly appropriate for honoring War Dogs and their partners. At sunset, the monument will silhouette against amber skies while quietly overlooking the green manicured lawns of our nation's largest veterans cemetery where over 114,000 are at final rest. The War Dog and Handler will symbolically watch over the park-like cemetery... while performing a *last patrol* on the outer perimeter around the giant Air Base, formerly known as March Air Force Base.

As you can see by

viewing the map (courtesy of Thomas Guide), March Field Museum is located exactly halfway between the Air Base's flight line and Riverside National Cemetery, which is only a stones throw from the museum grounds (for scale, the runway is 3 miles long!), and parallels the heavily traveled 215 Freeway. You can also check out March Field Museum's WebPage for an aerial view of part of the grounds, and read about placing a tiled tribute on the grounds. I recommend the museum, have been there, and drive by it daily.

VDHA: Because of American War Dogs, there are thousands fewer names etched in stone on

The Wall of the National Vietnam

Veterans Memorial, at Constitutional Park, Washington, D.C.. Ironically, at the end of the Vietnam War, military officials abandoned almost all the war dogs. **VDHA** writes, "Of the 10,000 men who served with K-9 units during the Vietnam War more than 265 were Killed in Action. Of the 4,000 Dogs that served, 281 were "Officially" listed as "Killed in Action", but only 190 were returned home at the end of the war. Over <u>500 dogs died on the battlefields of Vietnam."</u> Nevertheless, there has been no tribute to these dogs until the Discovery Channel program, sponsored by Nature's Recipe, as envisioned and promoted by the <u>Vietnam Dog Handler Association</u> to raise the memorial's \$1,500,000!

The second War Dogs Memorial is at Ft. Benning's Infantry Museum on the east coast. Proceeds from WAR DOGS project has helped fund the \$1,500,000 memorials to honor those heroic dogs and handlers who served in Vietnam.

Bob Rodocker said the statue, which stands about 18-feet, really stands out and that you can plainly see it from the I-215 freeway. As he said, "It is the best location for the Memorial, by far." Thousands of motorists will see it everyday! The Memorial will be draped for the dedication and be unveiled as part of the ceremony on Feb. 21.

VFW Post 9223 will be the Command Post for the dedication. If you are flying in and need a ride, please call the VFW at 909-688-7170 for the shuttle to the hotel. The VFW is at the corner of Tyler and Arlington. We have eight VDHA members who live in the area, in addition, a number of VDHA members from Southern Cal will also have cars. Getting a ride will not be a problem.

The hotel is the Best Western, 10518 Magnolia St., Riverside, 909-359-0770. The hotel is about two miles from the VFW and about 8

miles from March Air Field Museum. Tyler street is just one block from the hotel, so it is a straight shot up Tyler to the VFW.

At the moment we know of 45 members who will be staying at the hotel. There will be a short meeting at 6: 00 p.m., at the VFW Post on Sunday evening. This will give us a chance to meet, if we have already done so, and to talk about your participation in the next day's dedication.

VDHA members will get dashboard cards for Priority parking at the dedication, so we'll need to hand those out too. If you are driving to Riverside on Monday morning we need to get you a Priority parking slip. We'll have a plan of attack on that in the next couple of days. I'll let you know.

I am sending this to all VDHA members online. I know most of you cannot make it to the War Dog Memorial Dedication, but just in case your plans change, I wanted to make sure you got this information. I hate long e-mails, but I have no choice on this one. Sorry

In the future I will only send Memorial information back to those who say they coming. That way I don't jam your computer with a bunch of unnecessary e-mails. If you still want the info even if you aren't coming, please let me know.

I was in Riverside most of today and there is only one word to describe what will take place there on February 21. FANTASTIC!

When I arrived at the museum I was surprised and happy to see that the museum has its own sign on the freeway, the very busy I-215. I turned off and also saw the sign for the National Cemetery, so I drove there first to check out the new Medal of Honor Memorial.

When I drove in to the cemetery I expected to see a sign, even a small one, directing me to the Memorial - Nothing. Nada. If I didn't know it was there... well, now I feel we are very lucky to have it at March. At least people will know it is there. Nothing against the cemetery, because they have been behind us all the way, but the Museum is a much better location. During the two-hours I was at the Museum I'd bet 50-100 people toured the area.

I meet with Laura Benge of the War Dog Memorial Fund; Steve Clark, the General Manager of the March Field Museum; and world-renown sculptor, A. Thomas Schomberg, who did the memorial. We spent quite a bit of time trying to figure out the best spot for the memorial. We found a location that is in the front courtyard. A place where everyone who comes to the museum will see and go to it. It will be a very high profile place. Heck, you'll be able to see it from the freeway!

The memorial is made of bronze and will stand 18-feet tall. The handler stands 8-feet tall! One big memorial. It will face south so the sunshine will really make it sparkle. A great site for a great memorial. Oh, I have not seen the memorial yet. It is due for installation on Feb. 15.

After that meeting, I met with VDHA member Mike Mc Elroy, who is also the VFW 9223 Commander . I checked out their facility and it will be a great place to hang out if you come to town prior to the dedication, as well as a great place for our dinner Monday night.
