Flight Ramp conflagration: 26 Dead, 105 Wounded!

I was searching VSPA site for any information regarding casualties caused by accidents in 1965. I was looking for a information of a flight line incident that was caused when bomb ordnance was set incorrectly causing it to explode and a chain reaction ensued killing over 50 Air Force flight line and pilots besides many aircraft and the fuel dump, I don't believe we lost any A.P.s at that time.

I had worked the flight line that evening before being relieved and had just retired to my bunk when the first explosion occurred. Have you heard of that incident? It was a major incident for Biên Hòa Is there anywhere I can search for that kind of information?

Robert:

I believe your referring to the 5-16-65 incident which happened o/a 0825 hours A B-57 bomb laden U.S. Canberra accidentally caught fire which set off a chain reaction of exploding 250 LB and 500 LB bombs. Another version has it that a time-delay fuse on one of the bombs was set incorrectly and exploded. My notes from that time show ten B-57, one F-8 (USN) and several copters destroyed. 20 American bodies identified and 7 other Americans listed as missing. Total number of wounded stood at around 105.

In addition to the aircraft lost, we lost the fuel dumps, most all of the munitions on the ramps, the control tower, plus the parking ramp sustained numerous craters from the exploding munitions.

That afternoon a call went out for volunteers to search for wounded and others on the ramp. Several hours into the search we were ordered to clear the area due to bombs "cooking-off" and exploding. We resumed recovery operations the next day.

On May 16, 1965, while waiting to take off on a mission, a B-57B exploded on the ground at Biên Hòa, setting off a whole chain of secondary explosions. The resulting conflagration destroyed ten B-57s, eleven VNAF A-1H Skyraiders, and a US Navy F-8 Crusader and caused numerous casualties among air and ground crewmen.

Large numbers of USAF strike aircraft were sent to bases where pavement for aircraft parking was at a premium. Aircraft were parked wing tip to wing tip, vulnerable to an accidental explosion or enemy attack. A need for aircraft revetments was dramatically brought home on 15 May 1965 when the explosion of a bomb under the wing of a loaded B-57 aircraft set off a chain reaction of explosions on the parking apron at Biên Hòa AB, South Vietnam. Forty aircraft were destroyed, 26 Americans killed, and over 60 wounded.

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Even when dealing with common U.S. explosives, any call could be deadly, and trained, professional EOD troops were in constant danger on the job. On May 16, 1965, Biên Hòa AB, Republic of Vietnam, was mortar attacked, and several U.S. Air Force B-57 'Canberra' light bombers were blown up, scattering their loads of 500-pound bombs around the flight line. The bombs had armed fuses, and had been damaged by fire, explosion, and jarring as they flew around the flight line. These were truly haUSAFardous munitions. As the base EOD team, consisting of Captain E. McFeron, and Sergeants C. Bunch, A. Fidiam, and D. Hubbard, worked to disarm them, a 500 pounder detonated, killing all four men.
