SECURITY & LAW ENFORCEMENT BRANCH:

No significant events occurred within this branch during this quarter. The combining of both Security and Law Enforcement into one branch took place on 16 December 1971 and has proven to be very effective throughout this period. Several major problems were anticipated because of the change but none have developed. The branch was responsible for strengthening our island defense posture in January and February. This was accomplished by laying over 1000 meters of triple strand concentina wire which has enhanced the security of USAF resources. Trip flares were placed in many strategic locations around our area of responsibility and three USAF fighting positions were re-enforced with concrete slabs and soud bags. SUPPORT BRANCH: This branch continued to turn in excess equipment as manpower and post requirements were reduced. 38 Cal Revolvers turned into Supply - 5 Barracks furniture in the amount of \$9,990.30 Office Equipment in the amount of \$778.00

TRAINING BRANCH:

The training branch will close on 1 April 1972.


K-9 BRANCH:

OPERATIONS BRAUCH:

Several changes were noted by this branch at the ending of the guarter. On 10 July 1972, SSgt Mackey was relieved of duty with "B" Flight and assumed duties of NCOIC, Training and Intelligence. The Intelligence Section was deactivated in January and the Training Section in April by 7th AF PAD action. . The deactivation of these sections was a planned move in the closure of Bien Hoe Air Base. Jue to the extension of the proposed close out date, these sections were reactivated on a limited basis to insure the security force personnel were adequately trained and all possible intelligence concerning the security of Bien Hoa Air Base was known by security personnel. Captain Houchin was relieved of duty as Chief, Security Police on 26 July 1972 and Captain Corvin assumed that position. (On 1 August 1972, this in-"Stallation was subjected to the most intense enemy rocket bombardment suffered by any USAF installtion during the Vietnam conflict. For acts of heroism during this attack Captain Corvin, Captain Fletcher, SISgt Marton, NSgt Eaton, SSgt Perez and Sgt MacIntire were submitted for the Bronze Star Medal with Combat "V" Device. On 12 September 1972, Captain Fletcher was relieved of duty as Operations Officer and 1st/Lt Pack assumed that position.

SECURITY AND LAW EXPONCENE T BRANCH:

The only major change in the Law Enforcement operation during this quarter was the initiation of an extensive Security Police drug suppression program. This inguin

program was started in August 1972 and involves gate shakedowns, road blocks at the main entrance to the US cantonment area, checks of Vietnamese hut maid areas within US occupied barracks and the checking of Vietnamese trash trucks. All these checks are made at random by both A and B Flight and our personnel are assisted by both Quah Canh and a marijuana detector patrol dog team. To date, only one small "bust" has been made as a result of the program but it is also acting as a definite physiological effect on persons desiring to bring drugs into our area. In the Security area, this unit is still being augmented by a company of US Marine infantrymen. The original company commanded by Captain N.R. Hoskott was replaced by "I" Company, Captain Michael S. Kelly, Commander, in August 1972. In an effort to enhance the protection of building #2660, Security Police Defense Operations Center, the entire building was reveted in August using both sand bags and sand filled 55 gallon drums. All work was completed by Security Policemen on a self-help basis. In September, USAF Stinger aircraft were incorporated into the defense of Bien Hoa Air Base and numerous personnel and vehicle detector sensors were installed by US Marine personnel at various locations around the base perimeter. During this cuarter, this installation was subjected to two of the largest enemy rocket attacks ever launched against a US occupied air base in the entire Vietnam conflict and a detonation of major proportions in the WAF munitions holding area. For its actions during these emergencies, the Security Police Section has been recommended for the Air Force Unit Excellence Award. As a result of their dedication to duty in searching the area of the explosion which occurred on 10 September 1972, Capt Corwin, Capt Fletcher, Capt Pack, SNSgt Wharton, MSgt Eaton, SSgt Rogge, SSgt Warner and AIC Jones were recommended for the Air Force Commendation Hedal.

SUPPORT BRANCH:

Due to the increase in the number of personnel assigned there has been no equipment turned in. New equipment was issued to this branch as required due to changes in the local situation.

K-9 BRANCH:

Cn 2 August 1972, SSgt Griffin was relieved of duty with the K-9 Section and SSgt Clmstead assumed this position. During this cuarter, the F-9 Branch has been undergoing repairs on a self-help basis. These repairs included pointing,

a C-5A aircraft operation without mishap. During November, MSgt Clinton Shanefelter assumed duties as NCOIC, Security and Law Enforcement Branch. Due to the large turn over of assigned personnel in November, 31 Security Policemen were assigned TDY to this unit from Tan Son Nhut AB. Of this number, 13 have been returned to their home base.

TRAINING/INTELLIGENCE BRANCH

In addition to normal duties, this branch initiated a weekly intelligence report to 7th Air Force. Daily intelligence reports continue to be received from local agencies and are now being furnished to the Base Commander as well as all Security Police flights. Six personnel were upgraded to the 5 skill level this quarter and all assigned personnel received extensive training in Crater Analysis procedures which has proven beneficial during recent rocket attacks. A total of 63 base personnel were trained in Security Police augmentee duties.

INVESTIGATIONS BRANCH

A total of 108 cases were referred to this branch during this period. 16 of these cases involved the theft of government property valued at over \$11,000.00. Of these losses, a total of \$1,000 in property was recovered. The major theft was that of a USMC M-151 jeep, valued at over \$3,000. There were 39 cases of personal property thefts valued at over \$4,700.00. Of this property, \$380.00 was recovered. 11 drug cases were initiated this quarter, all involving the use and possession of Marijuana. Four of these cases are pending final laboratory results. Because of the increased work load, SSgt James L. Howard was reassigned to this branch in November as an additional investigator.

ADI IN AND REPORTS BRANCH

Due to the anticipation of a Vietnam cease fire, this branch dealt mainly with the destruction of non-essential classified material and is now in the process of updating all remaining classified material in accordance with Executive Order 11652. During this quarter, the three assigned personnel were all newly assigned replacing those personnel who had departed. SSgt Robbins replaced SSgt Pearce as Branch NCOIC in November.

SUPPCRT BRANCH

SSgt Olmstead was assigned as branch MCOIC replacing SSgt Rogge. Due to the unit's mission remaining essentially unchanged, no significant amount of equipment could be turned in during this period. In preparation for the massive turn-in of equipment that would occur in the event of a Vietnam ceasefire, all required supply turn-in documents have been completed and are being held on file.

OPERATIONS BRANCH

PERSOMNEL

The only major changes occurning in this branch during this period involved personnel. Captain Larkins arrived at the installation in October and assumed duties as Operations Officer replacing Captain Pack who was reassigned as Hight Flight Officer. Pending the departure of SiSgt Mharton who was placed on an Administrative Hold, MSgt Eaton was moved from the Security and Law Enforcement Branch to the Operations Branch. In December Captain Corvin was presented the Meritorious Service Medal and Air Force Commendation Medal for service at previous installations. Energy activity has remained at a high level and the section has performed in a highly professional manner during the numerous rocket attacks sustained this output of US Marines, commanded by Captain M. S. Kelly.

SECURITY AND LAW ENFORCEMENT BRANCH

No major operational problems were encountered within this branch during this quarter. Due to the reduction of US Army Military Police units in this area, it was necessary for this unit to augment the one remaining MP unit by making periodic checks of Bien Hoa City. Approximately two or three checks of the city are made by our patrols on a daily basis. In addition to implementing new anti-robbery procedures for all base agencies maintaining funds, armed Security Policeman are now being posted within the Bank of America at certain hours of the day to enhance the Security of this facility! SUMMARY

(U) The Det 1, 377th Air Base Wing which was activated on 15 September 1972 continued the role of the 6251st Air Base Squadron, which was that of the major United States Air Force unit on base and was tasked with supporting the 18 Special Operations Squadron, 8th Special Operations Squadron, Detachment 5, 8th Aerial Port Squadron, the 12th Marine Aircraft Group and the F-4 Forward Operating Location.

(U) There was no significant decrease in the base population during this period. The units that were brought in to counter the North Vietnamese Spring Offensive remained here at Bien Hoa Air Base and continued their air to ground operations against enemy forces and in support of allied forces.

(U) The Det 1, 377th Air Base Wing continued to provide the necessary support to all tenants despite its reduction in manning and the increase in activity at Bien Hoa Air Base. Most time phased actions on the 7th Air Force Program Action Directive were temporarily held in abeyance during this period.

(U) The Det 1, 377th Air Base Wing sustained two major rocket attacks during this period. On 1 August and 31 August 1972, the base received 75 and 64 confirmed rockets respectfully. The personnel of the detachment performed in an outstanding manner and were able to keep operational with a minimum of down time.

(U) 'On 10 September 1972, the VNAF munitions holding area exploded causing extensive damage to the VNAF side of Bien Hoa Air Base. The Air Force side of the base suffered extensive damage to many of the buildings.' A special Red Horse Team was brought in and they repaired the major damage. Again as on 1 and 31 August 1972, the outstanding performance of the base personnel insured that the base was kept operational with a minimum of lost time.

The squadron fley 70% of its missions in Jouth Vietnam; the percentage flown in Casbodia rose from 17% to 30% since the last quarter (2). on 1 September, the Sthill became operationally subordinate to the 6251st Air Enge squadron, when Col. Gregg Glick was replaced by Col. Stillman Taylor. on September 15 the 6251st became Det. 1, 377 Mir Base Ming. The squadron lost 8 pilots and gained five during the period covered; one of these remained TDY at De Neng. The command of the equadron continued with Lt. Col. Cordon d. geed until his DERCE on 16 July 1972. At that time, Lt. Col. Donald J. Loosely assumed command of the squadron through the end of the quarter. Major Douglas W. Stockton continued as Operations Officer for the entire quarter. The squadron added an executive officer, injer Louvie K. Llewellyn, this quarter. The squadron flow 1186 sorties in July and 1292 in mgust (2). Un 31 August, Hawk 07 and 08 were removed from the Alert Fad as part of the squa drom phasedown. Two scheduled sorties were cut on 6 September, leaving 12 daily scheduled sorties. On 12 September the number of scheduled sorties was reduced to 10 and further reduced to 8 the following day. On september 25, Hawk 05 and 06 were resoved from the elect Pad, followed by a schedule cut to four mortice on 27 September. At approximately 0600 the norming of 31 sugust, one of the squadran's aircraft was destroyed and two were damaged as a result of an enony rooket attack.

The maintonance personnel has a two-fold operation during the latter part of the quarter. First, they had to keep enough eircraft operational to fulfill the squadron's consituent. . . econd, they began reconfiguring the remaining affernit for eventual transfer to the Vietnamere Air Force. The maintenance personnel have done an outstanding job in ooth respects and are well ahead of achedule to accouplish the final transfer on 15 October.

The Sth was saddened to lose one or its pilots during the last quarter. On the evening of 23 July 1972, Map 23 flight was sent to a troops-in-contact situation on the east side of An Loc, at H11 169. The flight was lead by it. Steven H. Gravrock and was scheduled at night, but went early because of the troops-in-contact situation. On his first pass, It. Gravrock delivered his napalm low-angle and bagan to pull off the target. The sircraft startes to roll and impacted the ground west of the target area. The pilot sade no appurent attempt to eject. The squadron would like to dedicate this last historical report to the memory of Lt. Gravrock and the other Sthill pilote it was SECRET into LUPO who gave their lives so that the people of Southeast Asia might live in freedom.
