What the memorial means to War Dog Handlers

War Dogs Memorial- As a former USAF K-9 handler (Dà Nàng, Blackie, 1965-1966), I believe March Field Museum is the perfect location for the towering and first War Dogs monument. A prime location, both poetic and highly appropriate for honoring War Dogs and their partners. At sunset, the monument silhouettes against amber California skies while quietly overlooking the green manicured lawns of our nation's largest veterans cemetery where over 114,000 are at final rest. The War Dog and Handler symbolically watches over the park-like cemetery... while performing a *last patrol* on the outer perimeter around the giant Air Base, formerly known as March Air Force Base.

My K-9, Blackie (photo left), was a beautiful German Shepherd as you can see. Air Force Sentry dogs generally performed base perimeter security, in addition to bomb dumps and areas of critical access control. They were not, by training, friendly to anyone but their handlers. In fact, they hated everyone and everything, including other dogs. But toward their handler, all the love, friendship, and loyalty dogs are noted for was freely given. Blackie was everything I could have ever wanted in a dog. And I am not alone in that opinion, as the below email will show.

Blackie's first handler, Al Watts, was with the 1st sentry dog unit at Đà Nàng in 1965. He came over with **TOPDOG45** in 1965. I was selected from the squadron when most of the org left and came back? Al helped build the first USAF kennels at Đà Nàng AB, and had to give up his dog, Blackie. I remember Al well, and thank him for giving me Blackie, and training me to handle him. Al and I met after he read an article I posted with VDHA. We are both members of VSPA and VDHA.
